Impacts of Natural Disaster


- November 2013

- 6,000,000 displaced.

- Loss of income economic opportunity





Freedom of movement for criminals





Yolanda - Disaster Derived Criminal Opportunity (DDCO)

- Active recruitment into 'bar work'
- Active recruitment as 'agricultural labour'*
- Male as well as Female
- Sugar industry
- Effectively Bonded labour

- Need greater awareness of organised criminal activities in disaster scenarios

- Need to educate external military assistance (CIMIC)
