The County Farms provide opportunities for new starters in agriculture to set up a business on a let farm, with a house, farm buildings and land. The farms are predominantly Dairy units although there are a number of mixed livestock units.

The purpose of the farms estate is to provide an affordable opportunity for people to enter agriculture and the rural economy on a small scale before expanding on to a larger unit and progressing to further opportunities in the private sector. This reinforces the Council's commitment to increase access to opportunities and create a vibrant rural economy, improving skills and creating jobs.

60 – 90 Acres Staffordshire County Council offers starter farms ranging from 60 acres to 90 acres in size. These can be stock or dairy farms. Tenants are offered a 10 year Farm Business Tenancy.

Tom Redfern also farms a progression farm near Stafford. Staffordshire County Council offers a maximum term of 26 years on the estate.

Tom Redfern runs a commercial dairy enterprise and has continued to expand his business over the years. Mr Redfern supplies his milk to local dairy Wells Farm.

Tom started in 1984 on a Staffordshire County Council farm

with 35 acres where he milked cows. He was on this farm for 8 years when he then progressed onto a farm of 72 acres where he continued to milk cows. He stayed on the second farm for 4 years and then moved to New Enson Farm where he farms today. Tom increased his cow numbers and expanded his business continuously. Tom has been successful in expanding his business beyond Staffordshire County Council.



90 Acres The next stage is Progression Farms. Staffordshire County Council actively encourages tenants to expand their businesses and move into progression farms. These farms range from 90 acres upwards in size and are offered to tenants on a 16 year Farm Business Tenancy.

John Allan currently farms a progression unit just over 100 acres at Bleak House Farm near Burtonupon-Trent. Mr Allan runs the Leaventhorpe herd of pedigree Holsteins and was recently awarded the prestigious Holstein UK Master Breeder Award
